Witnesses to the glory of God in the face of Jesus will be unable to avoid reflecting that glory in the world. It was true for Moses. It was doubtless true for Peter, James, and John. We pray that it will be true of all of us who see the glory of the Lord in the word and in the supper and who are being "transformed into the same image" by the Spirit of God.

Please do not use cell phones and other electronic devices. The ringing of the *meditation bowl* calls us to silence, centering and reflection as we prepare for worship.

As you pass the *baptismal font* upon entering or leaving the church, and/or on the way to communion, you may *dip your hand in the water* and *make the sign of the cross*. This is an ancient body prayer to remember you are a baptized child of God. Simply touch your forehead, chest, left shoulder, then right shoulder.

GATHERING

Turn to face the cross as it enters; you may bow as the cross passes, honoring the mystery of our salvation.

Our liturgy is multi-sensory and shows the significance of our bodies and all of God's creation. Used in many religions, the sweet smell of **incense** represents the rising of our prayers and the aroma of Christ spreading in procession throughout the world. We honor (cense) the primary symbols of the liturgy: the people, font, ambo (lectern), book of scriptures, cross, and table (altar).

#838 Beautiful Savior Stanzas 2 & 3 – sung in harmony

During the greeting the presiding minister and assembly **bow toward one another**. We learn from Eastern cultures the deep significance of a bow as a sign of mutuality and the presence of Christ among us.

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all. And also with you.

Prayer of the Day

First Reading Exodus 34:29-35

WORD

The story of Moses' veil is one of the three Old Testament passages that the lectionary places next to the Transfiguration. Moses can look directly at Jesus; the disciples are able to see the shining divinity of Christ; and in the resurrection by faith, so can we all.

Word of God, word of life. Thanks be to God.

Refrain:



The Lord reigns; let the people tremble! God is throned on the cherubim; let the earth quake! The Lord is great in Zion, God is high above the nations. *Refrain*

May they praise your great and holy name! You are the holy one! Great judge, you love what is right, and have established justice in Jacob. *Refrain*

Glorify the Lord our God; bow down before the throne; Bow down] and worship God. You are the holy one. *Refrain*

Moses and Aaron among the priests, Samuel among those who called on God, all these cried to the Lord; God heard them and answered them. *Refrain*

In the pillar of cloud God spoke; they did God's will and kept the law. O Lord, you answered them; you punished their sins, but you forgave them. *Refrain*

Glorify the Lord our God; bow down at the holy hill, Bow down and worship God; the Lord our God is the holy one. *Refrain*



Psalm 99

Setting: Hal H. Hopson The cantor/choir sings the refrain first and the assembly repeats. The cantor/choir sings the verses. Contemporary devout Jews do not think of the Torah's representation of God as shining so radiantly that they cannot approach it. However, Paul's encounter with the risen Christ (1 Cor. 15:8) had led him to regard Judaism as a veil that could be removed in Christ. The Spirit of God means to transform us, just as Jesus was himself transformed by God. Paul's interpretation of passages from the Hebrew Scriptures begins the Christian practice of seeing in biblical Judaism the beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ and the vocabulary we use in speaking of salvation.

Word of God, word of life. Thanks be to God.

Stand to welcome the gospel as Christ—the Word of God—as it is proclaimed among us in this place and time. Turn to face the book as the gospel is read in the midst of the assembly, a sign of Christ among us.



Verse: This is my Son, my Chosen, listen to him! (Luke 9:35) Alleluia...

We too have encountered the presence of God, not on a Palestinian mountain, but in Jesus Christ. We too are called children of God, thanks to our baptism into Christ. Here on Sunday we listen to him, and for us now and at the end of time Jesus is the transforming manifestation of God. The optional verses are the one place in the threeyear lectionary with the story of the healing of the epileptic boy. To proclaim both stories is to tie the inexpressible glory of God with the power of Jesus to exorcize evil.





Holy, Holy This ancient song is the musical climax of the liturgy and uses texts from Isaiah and Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. At the words "blessed is he who comes," some make the **sign of the cross** as a connection to our baptism into Jesus' death and resurrection.

Communion

All are welcome at Christ's table, including children. Bread is received in the hands. Wine is received either by drinking from the (silver) common cup, or by saving the bread and dipping it in the second (glass) cup. Gluten-free wafers are available from the presiding minister. Those not communing may come forward for a blessing, keeping your hands folded over your chest. For those unable to consume either wine or bread, communion is received fully in either element alone.

Holy Trinity's radical welcome is also an **invitation to baptism** and a deeper connection to community. If you are not baptized, please speak to one of the pastors to learn more about the process of adult baptism.


